As the founder of the African American Leadership Program, Dr. Mitchell was a dynamic community leader. She founded the African American Leadership Program (AALP), which later became incorporated into the African American Leadership Alliance (AALAM), a systemic initiative addressing the development and sustainability of Black leadership throughout Milwaukee. She also originated the Latino Non-profit Leadership Program (LNLP) and the Neighborhood Leadership Institute (NLI) and numerous community-based initiatives that build leadership and wealth in communities of color.

Dr. Mitchell had extensive cross-sector experience in business, education, non-profit and politics. She built a 30-year career rising through ranks in the corporate sector, holding senior management roles at Ameritech/SBC/AT&T. Dr. Mitchell served as an elected representative on the City of Milwaukee School Board for eight years including three terms as Board President. Dr. Mitchell spent eight years in the non-profit sector as the first education program officer at the Helen Bader Foundation (currently Bader Philanthropies.) In 2000, Dr. Mitchell became the co-founder and Executive Director of the Stritch Leadership Center. In 2023, Mitchell was named the 2023 Business Champion by the African American Chamber of Commerce.

Dr. Mitchell held a BA in Business Management from Alverno College, an MBA from University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee and a Doctorate in Leadership for the Advancement of Learning and Service from Cardinal Stritch University. She took joy in life as a devoted mother, mentor, reader, patron of the arts, storyteller and traveler.

In addition to her academic leadership and partnership development roles, Carol led and built MATC's first college-wide Women's Affinity group and is a current executive sponsor of the "Labor Ladies" student club providing support to work in careers where women are greatly underrepresented.

Carol is currently involved in EmpowHER WI promoting women in construction, the SE WI chapter of Women in Manufacturing, TEMPO Milwaukee, a Bay View Community Center Board Director and is a new Women's Fund of Greater Milwaukee Board Director.

Notably, she has also used her passion as the Founder of the popular Chill on the Hill concert series and produced the event for its first 10 years, was the Co-Founder and first President of the Bay View Neighborhood Association. She successfully ran for public office to represent 20 schools and their stakeholders as the elected 8th District Milwaukee Public School Board Director from 2015-2019.

Erin Loos Cutraro is the founder and CEO of She Should Run, the trailblazing nonpartisan nonprofit on a mission to revolutionize the landscape of women in American political leadership by shattering barriers and redefining possibilities for women in elected office. Since its inception, She Should Run has become a beacon of empowerment, offering powerful first steps in civic engagement to hundreds of thousands of women from all walks of life whose formidable leadership potential would go otherwise untapped in conventional political recruitment.

Before joining She Should Run, Erin designed and implemented strategic programs for companies, campaigns, and organizations that traverse the public policy, nonprofit, and financial business arenas. As the political director of the Women's Campaign Fund, Erin advised female candidates at the national, state, and local levels. Before that, she served at an educational nonprofit and in state government in the Office of Missouri's Secretary of State Robin Carnahan, whom she helped elect statewide as part of Carnahan's campaign team in 2004.

Erin began her career as a public school teacher and has a life-long dedication to improving the lives of others through learning. She earned an M.A. in Communication from St. Louis University and B.A. in Education from the University of Missouri.

Erin's two daughters motivate her to champion the systematic and cultural change needed to see gender equality for women and girls in our lifetime.

WOMEN'S FUND ★ IMPACT STORIES ★

Since 1989, the Women's Fund has been a dedicated champion of gender equity, making grants that disrupt the status quo for women and girls. Over the years, we have invested more than \$3.9M in fostering civic engagement and leadership.

ALVERNO COLLEGE, RESEARCH CENTER FOR WOMEN AND GIRLS

PROJECT OVERVIEW: In 2020, the Women's Fund invested in a research project in partnership with Alverno College's Research Center for Women and Girls (RCWG) to better understand women's pathways to office in Wisconsin. The resulting research (published in 2022) reinforced that Wisconsin has made great strides regarding gender equity within the political landscape, yet the progress we have made remains fragile and demands our unwavering attention and advocacy. The project provided valuable information about how we can better support women in public office.

RESULTS: As the report explains, "Readiness" is not a given. Politicians urged women to run for office even if they do not feel qualified or "ready." Additionally, public office is not an opportunity that privileges one set of skills or strengths over any other. Rather, it requires a variety of strengths and experiences. Politicians build on their experiences and fit themselves to the role. The study noted that there is something sacred about women running for and serving in public office. The lived experiences of women provide a unique perspective that can amplify issues that might otherwise be overlooked.

The study found that concerns about running for office included knowledge of issues, how politics works, and procedures. Concerns also included time away from familial responsibilities and childcare. Another finding was that politicians felt they sacrificed their mental health, physical health, or personal safety. Importantly, racial bias was cited as a concern too.

ACTIONABLES: Through this research, RCWG identified key recommendations for encouraging and empowering women to run for public office. These include:

- Reducing gender gaps in political interest, working to combat gender socialization that may discourage youth to become civically engaged.

- Increasing understanding of opportunities, acknowledging that interest in public life may look different for people.
- Recognizing the importance of diverse perspectives and emphasize that no matter a person's path, all roles are important to democracy.
- Using a strengths-based perspective to combat social penalties for straying from gender roles. Educate oneself about gender socialization and encourage youth to engage in this education themselves.

SUMMARY: Now more than ever, we need solidarity across all sectors to push for systemic changes that make gender equity a reality, not just an aspiration. It is only through our collective efforts that we can ensure a future where all individuals, regardless of gender, can participate fully and equally in political life.
